Rockwell's posters of the American way of life has become classics of American popular culture. They illustrator national values, and without the captions, the viewer would not know that these are in any way related to a war. Rockwell posters espouse traditional values, home, country and family. Each scene contains individuals at ease with themselves in an essentially hospitable world, rendered in exquisite detail. FDR described the Four Freedoms in his 1941 State of the Union address. Rockwell offered to illustrate the Freedoms but the Office of War Information, the main agency in charge of posters, but was refused. The OWI considered him an illustrator not an artist. The Saturday Evening Post did commission the series. The OWI ate humble pie and issued the Freedoms in 1943. Rockwell wrote, "I do ordinary people in everyday situations. Whatever I have to express I have to express in those terms...even fairly big ideas. Freedom of

At the start of the United States' involvement in World War II, the Roosevelt administration countered the powerful antiwar messages of such media figures as newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst and radio personality Father Coughlin, with a call to artists for designs for the National War Poster Competition, held under the auspices of Artists for Victory, Inc., the Council for Democracy, and the Museum of Modern Art with the cooperation of the Office of Civilian Defense.

Artists from 43 states submitted 2,224 designs, and the posters portrayed eight themes selected from President Roosevelt's first war message to Congress on January 6,1942. The themes included: "The Enemy is Listening;" "Loose Talk Sinks Ships;" "Slave World or Free World;" "Victory Starts Here;" "Someone Talked;" "Sacrifice--The Privilege of Free Men;" "On the Job--The Boys Need Guns;" and "Go Without So They Won't Have To."
